“ My memories of Kathy began when I was 10 and she was 8. We moved into the tenant house on my Grandparents farm. Kathy’s home was on one corner of my Grandparents home. Actually our connection began much earlier than when her Dad, Chum, helped my Mom and Dad elope. She was one of five girls. After the first time I walked to her house for a visit I told my parents that they had odd names; Renny, Shanny, Happy (Kathy), Sally and Nanny. All nicknames given to them by their Dad. We picked blueberries together by Grand Junction. The first day my blueberry count was low since I had eaten so many. Kathy loaned me some of hers so I wouldn’t look so lazy. We didn’t get to go to school together very long. Just my sixth grade at Berlamont. Kathy and her family moved to Grand Junction for a while and I finished school in Bangor. We still managed to keep in touch off and on. Including a memorable trip to Lake Michigan in Buzz’s car while he was still in service. She sent me anonymous cards from various locations in Michigan. It might have even been a Christmas card in the middle of the summer. They were cards she got from places where she had bought an estate. My girls referred to her as the “goat lady”. We visited her every year when she was in charge of the goat barn at the Allegan fair. When my Dad died she brought a boiled pot roast dinner to my home. She was surprised that more people weren’t there. She got to my home before my Dad’s body which was sent back to Michigan from Florida. In more recent years we kept in touch by phone. Not many can claim a friendship of over seventy years.

She will be greatly missed and still loved!
